

TEXT AS A GRAPHIC ELEMENT



Creating this popular graphic technique is easy using InDesign's Create Outlines and Paste Into commands. The technique could be used with just senior names, the names of the entire student body or even theme copy.

In the example, the foreground text was pasted into a shape created from text. However, a rectangle, circle or any other free-form closed-path shape could be used. Get creative!



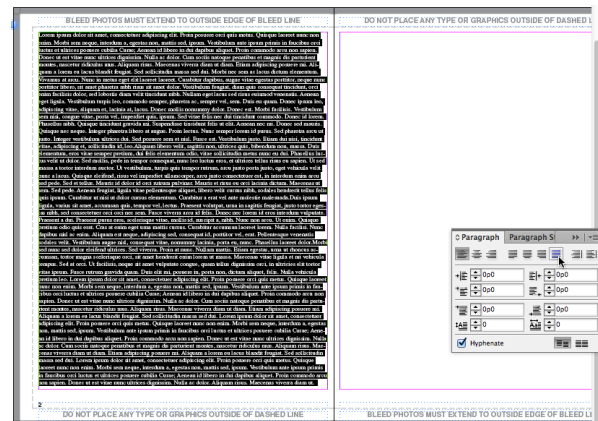
TYPE OR IMPORT TEXT

- Click on the **Type** tool
- Draw a text block large enough to cover the page
- Type or import text
- Change the Font, Point Size and Leading if needed with the **Control** panel or go to **Type > Character**



SET THE ALIGNMENT

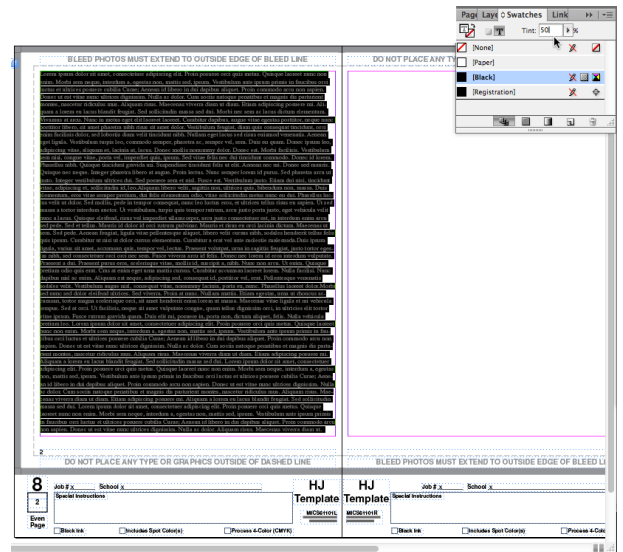
- Click on the text frame with the **Type** tool
- Go to **Edit > Select All**
- Go to **Type > Paragraph**
- In the panel, click **Justify All Lines**
- Adjust the type characteristics and/or text frame size if needed
- Don't change the type characteristics or text after this point



COPY THE TEXT FRAME



- Click on the **Selection** tool
- Click on the text frame to select it
- Go to **Edit > Copy**

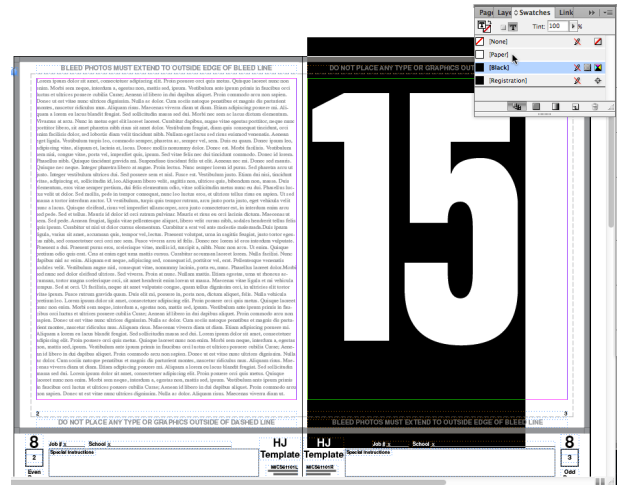


TINT THE TEXT

- Click on the **Type** tool
- Click in the text frame
- Go to **Edit > Select All**
- Open the Swatches palette
- Bring the **Text Fill** to the front
- Change the **Tint** to **50% Black**

CREATE LARGE TEXT

- Use the **Type** tool to create a new text frame as large as the original text frame.
- Type the text that will appear on top of the “background” text.
 - Use a large point size.
 - In this example, 15 was set in 800pt AHJ Josie
- Highlight the “foreground” text (15) with the **Type** tool
- Open the **Swatches** panel.
- Click on **Paper**. The text will turn white.



MOVE THE TEXT

- Click on the **Selection** tool
- Select the foreground text (15) and drag it on top of the background text frame.
